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Subject: Analysis of Students Lost between Winter 2020 and Spring 2020

In winter 2020, the campus shifted fully online at the start of week 11 and transitioned to a fully online spring 2020 quarter. This analysis looks at students who were enrolled in winter 2020 and did not re-enroll in spring 2020.

Highlights include:

- Retention rates from year to year remained rather stable, with only a two percentage point drop from 77% last winter to spring to 75% this winter to spring.
- Awards conferred to students in winter 2020 remained rather stable as well with a 1 percentage point decrease from 3% of all students to 2% of all students receiving an award in the winter term.
 - o Those <u>least</u> likely to re-enroll from winter 2020 to spring 2020 included:
 - Latinx, African American, and White students
 - Students with a Bachelor's degree or higher
 - Students without an educational goal of Transfer or Degree
 - Students receiving no financial aid
 - Students on two-term probation
 - Returning students who have not enrolled at De Anza over consecutive terms, and First-time-Transfer Students who had attended another college prior to De Anza.
 - Foster Youth students and Veterans
 - Students who received a W, I, D- or NP grade
 - o Those most likely to re-enroll from winter 2020 to spring 2020 included:
 - Asian, Filipinx and Pacific Islander students
 - Students with only a high school diploma
 - Students with an educational goal of Transfer or Degree
 - Students with Pell or Promise grants
 - Continuing students who have remained enrolled over consecutive terms and First-time students who were new to college in the winter
 - Students not on probation
 - EOPS Students and International students in the International Student Program (ISP)
 - Students who received any passing grade or an EW grade

• Last winter to spring the retention rate was 77%, the rate decreased slightly to 75% between winter 2020 and spring 2020.

• Asian students comprised the largest group that did not return at 1,460 students, but had an overall lower rate of non-returning than other students groups at 20%.

• The highest rate of non-returning students by prior education level by population are students who already had a Bachelor's degree or higher with 45% non-returning followed by students with an Associate's degree at 43% not returning. The largest group of returning students are those with only a high school diploma.

• The student groups with the highest attrition rates were Returning students (had attended De Anza in the past and returned after a quarter off) where 55% did not return followed by First-Time Transfer Students, students who were enrolled at another college and are new to De Anza, where 52% did not return. The group with the lowest attrition are Continuing students who have remained continuously enrolled where only 19% did not return.

• Students on two-term probation have a higher rate of attrition than all other students by 8 percentage points. Of students on two-term probation in the winter, 32% did not re-enroll, compared to 24% of all other students who did not re-enroll.

- Students who received a non-passing (NP) grade in winter 2020 were least likely to re-enroll in spring 2020, with 38% of those students not returning.
 - This is followed by 30% of students who received a W grade not returning and 29% of students who received a D- not returning.
 - o Surprisingly, students who received an EW grade had a rather low rate of non-returning, at only 17%, lower than other non-passing grades.
