FOOTHILL COLLEGE



At their October 25 meeting, the FHDA Board voted unanimously not to renew the contract of Foothill President Thuy Thi Nguyen, who has served as president since 2016. At this meeting, the Foothill Academic Senate presented a resolution of "no confidence" in Nguyen, which stated "In contrast to her job description, President Nguyen has failed to cultivate increased involvement in shared/participatory governance, and as a result we have a governance process that renders the voices of faculty to be of no possible consequence or value other than to rubber stamp or validate decisions that have already been made." In an October 26 article

in the Los Altos Town Crier, Board president Peter Landsberger summed up the decision as follows:

While I am limited in what more I can say about the action and what led to it, I can say the board believes this action is needed to allow the college to move beyond the current state of conflict. The Board of Trustees respects President Nguyen's accomplishments and recognizes that she is admired by many. Nevertheless, the board's priority must be to take steps to establish the conditions under which administrators, faculty, staff, and students can work collaboratively to achieve student success with universally equitable outcomes. The board has placed the achievement of the district's equity and student success goals at the heart of its board priorities. Nothing in this action should be interpreted as a retreat from Foothill's equity agenda.

District Chancellor Judy Miner added, "I believe it is in the best interests of Foothill College to seek new leadership that can reinvigorate collaborative approaches to being student centered and equity minded. Going forward, let us focus on the future and recommit to nurturing a collegial environment that is conducive to teaching and learning. We owe it to our students." Miner said she, Landsberger, and former Foothill president Bernadine Fong, who will replace Nguyen as of November 1, 2021, will hold a college wide meeting "to begin the healing process."

FODARA SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

For 2020-21, FODARA awarded four \$1000 scholarships, two at De Anza and two at Foothill. Below are the winning students' inspiring personal essays (edited for privacy and space).

Austin (De Anza) Major: Psychology for Transfer



Throughout my childhood, I was raised with a constant reminder of the importance of service. The religion I was born into ingrained within me the value of close community and support. Everyone was expected to be there for each other and to offer what they could. This regular practice of being there for others has stayed with me, even after I had left the faith. Middle school was difficult. As I adjusted to a new school, I also had to adjust to a new me. After being closed within a tightknit Mormon community, I discovered for the first time what it meant to be gay. I quickly discovered that I no longer belonged to the group who brought me up. I took a major risk and opened up to my mom. I finally found the words and was surprised to be met with so much love. She expressed that she didn't know what this meant, but that she would always love me and always had my back. I knew then, I would be ok. The remaining two years of middle school dragged on. Eventually, relief finally came with a move to California. I was ecstatic by the fresh start high school offered. Unfortunately, there was no pre-established LGBTQ

club. After meeting some friends, we decided to begin one ourselves during our sophomore year. The room was packed at our first meeting, and instantly the group began to unite. As I looked around the room, I heard struggling teenagers giving the support and advice that they themselves needed; we were able to offer each other advocacy and help. That was the moment I knew this was something real. After losing the community I had grown up with, it was magical to build my own that I knew I could truly fit into. I continued to pursue my love of service as time went on. I volunteered at the LGBTQ Youth Space where I was exposed to real life community advocacy. At this same time, I fell in love with my high school AP Psychology course and discovered a field committed to improving the lives of others. At De Anza I have continued to explore the vast diversity this field has to offer and pinpoint my own passions. As I prepare to transfer to a four-year university in pursuit of my future in psychology, I have worked to develop the skills I need through my classes and work as a tutor in the Writing and Reading Center. My dream is to serve others on the most personal level possible, as a counselor/therapist, to listen to and be there for others just like my mom was there for me. This world is so full of sorrow and rejection, and we need as many people working one-on-one on the ground level as possible in order to heal. I am devoted to continuing this journey of being a part of this movement: a push for connection, empathy, and hope.

Annalise (De Anza) Major: Journalism

Tucked away in the upper portion of my closet rests my favorite childhood stories-- *Goose Girl, Walk Two Moons*, and *Holes*. They were the early catalysts for my love of literature. I have far outgrown their plots and should probably gift them to a new home. But I can't. I can't let go of these books because they have shaped me into who I am today. Enraptured by their stories, I formed my empathetic morals and values that I hold today. They are the pillars of who I have become at De Anza and outside of it. I like to think that my path, both academic and career-driven, is uplifted by these first novels.

Currently, I am pursuing a journalism degree, with hopes of continuing my education all the way to a master's degree in journalism. Journalism may not seem to have much of a connection to my bibliophilia, but it does. As a journalist, I am empowered through my ability to empathize with people who I interview, which in turn allows me a greater connection to the stories that I write. For instance, I listened to an undocumented student illustrate her trek through the desert, drawing on my ability to empathize with an experience I have not had and will never personally endure. This deep emotional connection I develop with my sources drives my yearning to uplift unheard voices; I believe my success as a journalist was all formed through the empathy I learned from stepping into characters' shoes in the novels I devoured. I am able to see outside perspectives other than my own, and this path that I'm on is truly rewarding.

Additionally, my ability to empathize propels me forward in my path in journalism. I was diagnosed with social anxiety and depression in my freshman year of high school, which seems so at odds with my career choice. As a journalist, I have to talk with people every day, and my empathy allows me to triumph over my anxieties. My hands still shake a bit and my thoughts can't help from racing when I talk to someone new, but I am much better than I once was, incapacitated by my social fears. My need to understand others outweighs the anxieties that I face on a daily basis, and I am more resilient because of it. However, the academic and professional path I am headed down is not cheap. My family is classified as middle class, but with the rising tuition rates of the universities coupled with the inflated prices of living in the Bay Area, I will have to take out an exorbitant amount of student loans. My family simply cannot support my academic endeavors. If I had the privilege of being granted a scholarship, I would use it to pay off some of my future tuition fees, with less worry about student loan debt. Ultimately, I am a journalist through and through, fueled by my own personal empathy and curiosity. I am resilient. I am determined to use my power as a journalist to uplift voices that are not being listened to through receiving a degree in journalism.

Moksha (Foothill) Major: Psychology

I have always believed education allows me to reach for the stars because of the values my immigrant parents instilled in me regarding its importance. I knew I had to succeed in my studies, so when my family's personal and financial struggles stripped my life of comfort and consistency, I learned to become resilient and adaptable in the face of challenges. I was inspired to pursue my degree in psychology because of its amazing capacity to explain the social world from the perspective of the human brain. At Foothill College, I have explored my interests in the field of psychology without any economic burden. This has allowed me to plan my long-term educational and career goals of earning my Ph.D. to understand the inner workings of the mind in order to help others. Through financial assistance, I will be able to fulfill my dreams of studying psychology further and benefitting the communities I enter.

My parents' personal problems, combined with our family's financial struggles, required me to attend three high schools. For years, I felt lost and out of control, but then in my final year of high school, I took an AP psychology course which granted me command over my fate and ignited a deep passion in me to study psychology further. Through uncovering the secrets of the human psyche, and its impact on behavior and relationships, I could comprehend my circumstances and figure out how to change them for the better. My desire to study psychology to a further extent was dynamic, as my ability to see the world had transformed into an ability to understand it. Attending a four-year school was not feasible at first due to my parents' economic situation, but my determination to succeed academically brought me to Foothill College. With unwavering persistence to make it in higher education, I closely engaged with my academic community through taking part in the Honors program, working two jobs, creating close relationships with my peers, and participating in clubs. These enriching experiences have prepared me for my transfer to a four-year college or university. UCLA is my top choice school for transferring, and I have also applied to other UC and CSU schools. 

As I got older, I started writing short stories as school projects. I didn't have ambitions at being a full-time writer; I just enjoyed putting on paper my thoughts and feelings.


Desire to Write a Novel

My outlook on life has mostly been centered on people and relationships – I value family and cherish my friendships. During my formative years, I developed a love for history and found it to be a very effective instructive tool. By studying history, one learns what others did before, and whether what they did made things better or worse. British statesman Winston Churchill once wrote, "Those that fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it." This adage remains true today.

My study of history included the American Civil War and, beginning in the 1990s, the concept of a story about the Civil War began to formulate. My ideas were influenced by the hundreds of letters and diaries I read that were written by people who participated in or lived during the Civil War. They described what life was really like for everyday people. Over time, I found myself reading more about people from the South and specifically Virginia. But, I still needed some type of catalyst to unlock how I was going to write my story.

Cold Mountain Influence

In 2010, Kathleen Moberg of De Anza College loaned me her copy of *Cold Mountain* by Charles Frazier. The book takes place during the Civil War, but its focus is human interests. I was captivated with descriptive writing style used by Frazier. After reading *Cold Mountain*, I wrote a 20-paragraph scene where an aging ex-Confederate soldier who participated in Pickett's Charge at the Battle of Gettysburg returns there in search of the body of his boyhood friend who died in that



charge.

Writing the Novel

Because I was still working for FHDA, some time passed before I started writing. First, I reread that 20-paragraph short story to stimulate my thoughts. I then sketched out the storyline and chapters and began to write. I had my wife and a very good friend review my first draft. They thought it was a nice story but said it read like a textbook. I realized I didn't know how to write a story that would keep the reader engaged. I found a book entitled From Where You Dream, by Robert Olden Butler and Janet Burroway. I took over 250 handwritten notes, then created the second draft focusing on character development, storyline, and converting descriptive narrative into dialogue.

Editing the Novel/ Searching for a Publisher I then worked with a professional editor and my third draft was completed in August, 2016. With the assistance of a faculty member from Mission College, I created a "Query Letter" whose purpose is to entice agents and publishers to show interest in my novel. Over

a 6-month period, I submitted my book to over 75 different publishing organizations. The only responses I received were from what are called "Vanity Publishers," companies who claim they love your work as an inducement to sign an agreement to purchase thousands of dollars in publishing services with no guarantees of selling a single book.

I decided to self-publish with the then publishing function of Amazon.com which helped me design a cover, performed interior page formatting, and created both a hardcopy and e-Book version. In June 2017, my book went on sale, and, in October 2017, it was accepted by the Library of Congress into its Master Catalog. *Windows to the Past: A Virginian's Experience in the Civil War* is available on Amazon in both Kindle/ebook and paperback versions: <u>Amazon.com : windows to the past%3A a virginian%27s experience in the civil war</u>. I am currently seeking a publisher for my second novel, *Lost Cause-Justice Found*, a sequel to my first novel.



In Memoríam Gloria Finston Malcolm Gutter Gloria Mitchell Deníse Swett



Gloria Jo Finston passed away September 6. She was 83. Born in Chicago, Gloria earned a BA in Teaching from Earlham College followed by a Master's Degree in teaching learning disabled students from Santa Clara University. A Palo Alto resident since 1966, she worked at Van Auken Elementary School in Palo Alto and then at De Anza College as a learning disability specialist. She enjoyed hiking at Foothills Park and in the Bay Area foothills, gardening, aerobics, swimming, attending TheaterWorks Productions at the Lucy Stern Community Center, tandem biking with her husband Roland, and tea with friends. Malcolm Gutter passed away October 2 in San Francisco due to complications resulting from a stroke three weeks earlier. He was 88. As a young UC Berkeley graduate, Malcolm was one of the expanded faculty that opened the new Los Altos Hills campus in 1958. Malcolm taught Economics at Foothill College for thirty-eight years before retiring in 1997. Although business education was his chosen profession, his interests varied widely. Born and educated in New York City, music was an important part of growing up, especially having a brother with an established career as a musicologist and symphony conductor. Early on, Malcolm developed a passion for antiques. He haunted auctions and estate sales, avidly studying catalogs and spending summers in Europe visiting museums and collections. These guests led to an appraiser's license and

for many years teaching Art & Antiques Appreciation classes through UC Extension. Porcelain, particularly 17th-18th century Meissen, became his focus and he began avidly collecting. Over the years he built what is recognized internationally as one of the most important collections of early Meissen. In 2018 The Palace of the Legion of Honor Museum in San Francisco mounted an exhibition and published a catalogue raisonne, *A Princely Pursuit: the Malcolm D. Gutter Collection of Early Meissen Porcelain,* with color plates of the entire collection, along with his recollection of his adventure in acquiring each piece. Malcolm left all of them to the Museum, where they will be shown in the newly renovated Porcelain Gallery. He is survived by Timothy Thornburn, his partner for over thirty years, and three nieces.
