Course objectives:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of language as the primary expression of culture and a medium of communication.
- 2. Compare and contrast the basic differences between Japanese and English
- 3. Recognize the sentence patterns in the low beginner level of the Japanese language within the range of the first quarter level, and reinforce the ability to communicate in the Japanese language by practicing listening, speaking, reading and writing skills
- 4. Evaluate and interpret the historical and cultural development of Japan that affect communication pattern and cultural context in the low beginner level of Japanese language, and engage in critical analysis of student's own cultural value and that of Japanese.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO)

Demonstrate a working command of essential vocabulary and language structures necessary to request and provide, orally and in writing (recognize and reproduce 46 Japanese syllable-based Hiragana characters as well as Katakana characters respectively, 29 Kanji), basic/simple information relating to high-frequency situations in familiar contexts such as greetings, introductions, shopping, restaurant, school, dating, and invitations."

- Performing greetings.
- ❖ Introducing yourself with basic biographical information, such as your name, occupation/school, major, age, and nationality [L1].
- Providing basic biographical information about others, including your family members and friends [L1].
- ❖ Producing simple questions, such as time of the day, price of the items, days, weeks, months, and years [L1, L2, L4].
- ❖ Asking confirmation or asserting new information with the sentence particle *ne* or *yo* [L2].
- Counting with numbers and classifiers [L1, L2,].
- ❖ Identifying items, using location pronouns [L2].
- ❖ Purchasing some items at a store [L2].
- Ordering food at a restaurant [L2].
- ❖ Describing your daily routine from morning to night [L3].
- ❖ Describing how often you do such daily activities [L3].
- Inviting someone to some activities [L3]
- Describing where things are, using location words [L4].
- ❖ Describing your room, its contents, and where they are located [L4].
- ❖ Describing your weekly schedule, including weekday and weekend activities [L4].

Procedures:

- a. In remote language teaching, we cannot meet in person, but it is still by far the best to have every class on Zoom, so that we can maximize our contact hours and face-to-face practice sessions, which is absolutely mandatory for language acquisition. - b. You are expected to be well prepared for each class session: due to time limitations, (1) preview each lesson including Substitution Drills & Exercises, (2) practice writing by yourself, and (3) make a good habit with listening to Japanese language via TV, radio, and/or animation in Japanese.
