Course Description

This is a foundation course in the use of fundamental design elements and principles for twodimensional art.

Course Objectives

- A. Demonstrate the basic elements of design through composition.
- B. Demonstrate the basic principles of design through composition.
- C. Demonstrate the creative process.
- D. Produce designs using a variety of two-dimensional art materials.
- E. Compare and contrast a variety of two-dimensional works of art representing a diversity of art traditions and cultures
- F. Develop problem-solving skills in visual planning and design

CSLOs

Utilize critique skills to evaluate and analyze works of art for cultural/historical influences, strengths and areas for improvement.

Course Outline

- A. Demonstrate the basic elements of design through composition.
 - 1.Examine the role that line, shape, texture, value and space play in a composition.
 - 2. Understand the relationship between object and ground for creating a sense of depth in the picture plane.
 - 3. Evaluate composition for placement and proportion as related to elements of design.
- B. Demonstrate the basic principles of design through composition.
 - 1.Examine the role that proportion, balance, emphasis, rhythm, and unity play in a composition.
 - 2. Utilize the basic elements of design to support sense of balance and movement throughout a composition.
 - 3.Identify primary and secondary focal points and dominant areas of a composition that contribute to the visualflow in a composition.
- C. Demonstrate the creative process.
 - 1. Planning the drawing with thumbnail sketches and mock-ups.
 - 2. Use intuition in finding one's own unique aesthetic and cultivating your own visual preferences.

- 3. Incorporate design principles, technique and execution in understanding one's own design choices.
- 4. Evaluate the strengths and areas for improvement on the works in progress.
- 5. Engage in dialogue about the finished drawings in the form of group critiques both large and small.
- D. Produce designs using a variety of two-dimensional art materials.
 - 1. Explore ways of creating value and line using traditional drawing media such as graphite & inks on paper.
 - 2. Explore ways to create space and shape using collage and cut silhouettes using construction paper.
 - 3. Explore ways to create value and texture using graphite, inks and acrylic paint.
- E. Compare and contrast a variety of two-dimensional works of art representing a diversity of art traditions and cultures
 - 1. Understand the use of materials in the production of works of art
 - 2. Explore the canons of images and the organization of visual forms used throughout the world.
 - 3. Identify the functions of two-dimensional art and its value or role in a particular society such as advertising graphics, illustration, murals, paintings and drawings.
- F. Develop problem-solving skills in visual planning and design
 - 1. Build up of ideas through thumbnail sketches, mock-ups and variations.
 - 2. Collaborative brainstorming discussions on improving projects in progress.

Hybrid Course Structure

- **In-Person Class Meetings:** our listed class meetings happen in person on campus. Students are required to come to each class on time. Attendance is mandatory
- Online Canvas: This course resides on the course management system called Canvas.
 It is accessible from MyPortal. Weekly course content will be posted. Besides attending
 in-person meetings, students follow weekly online module and study materials. Weekly
 announcements and reminders will be posted.
- Online Learning Equipment: (1) Device. Students are highly encouraged to use a
 computer to access Canvas. The interface of Canvas on phone/tablet is more difficult to
 navigate. (2) Stable internet (3) Camera to photograph finished work to upload onto
 Canvas if needed
- Homework: Homework for the course includes exercises, assignments, Canvas discussions, etc. This is a major component of the course. Some homework will start in

class meetings and can be completed during class. Some require students to spend time outside of class and complete at home. Besides online submission, students need to bring homework to class and participate in informal critiques.

All homework will be evaluated and graded within 1 week after the due date. All grades will display in Canvas

- Instructional Feedback/Guidance: Individual guidance is available in-person and online. Students are encouraged to ask questions in class or message for through Canvas Inbox. For questions sent online, please expect 48 hours to have your questions answered.
- Instructor communicates with you through weekly Announcements in class and online.
 Thoroughly read (DO NOT skim) them. You are responsible for the information
 communicated. Additionally, your instructor might have the need to communicate with
 you individually. Check your Canvas regularly for grades, assignment feedback and
 discussion responses
- Peer Support- Discussions & Critiques: For some homework, students will post their drawings or response to course content in Discussions under Canvas. Students' support for their peers is essential to our community and is part of the course grade. Make comments for peers to receive participation points. Critiques will be held in person. Please see the next item.
- Midterm Critique & Final Critique: Midterm Critique and Final Critique will be conducted in person where students provide feedback for their peers. Students' comments will be graded. Detailed instructions will be given.
- Office Hours: Weekly Office Hour for questions and individual guidance. No appointment needed.

Participation & Engagement

- Students are expected to come to class on time with the necessary materials and remain in class until the class is officially dismissed. Students are expected to make full use of studio drawing time and to be engaged in all coursework. <u>Any personal appointments</u> should be made at times other than class time.
- Students are also expected to study materials assigned online. Both in-person and online components are equally important for the hybrid modality.
- It is the student's responsibility to make up all work missed due to absences (excused or unexcused), and to make arrangements with the instructor in the case of excessive absences due to serious illness or other unexpected, compelling issues.
- Participation & contribution in class is important, which includes a mature and responsible approach to the subject, to the instructor, and to one's peers. <u>Please remain supportive</u> and respectful with your verbal comments during critiques AND written comments on Canvas
