COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory survey course in the history of western art from ca. 600 to 1599 CE. Art and architecture produced in Europe will be analyzed for its cultural, historical as well as political significance. Major works of art along with the concept of the artist and architect will be explored during the Medieval and Renaissance. This course will also include Islamic art and architecture. Students will develop a vocabulary to discuss works of art and become familiar with a variety of art and architecture related media and methods. **Recommended**: English Writing 1A or English as a Second Language 5

This is an online course with images, concepts and vocabulary presented through lecture videos, a required text, art history videos, discussion forums, and additional readings

PARTICIPATION

Students are required to "check-in" the first day of class. For this course, this requirement is met by completing the <u>Syllabus Quiz by Wednesday, Sept. 27th.</u> Failure to complete this quiz will result in a student being dropped from the course.

Regular participation through discussions, assignments and exams is expected. If a student fails to submit 2

weeks of consecutive assignments, he/she will be contacted by the instructor. However, it is the student's responsibility to drop the course if he/she no longer desires to be enrolled.

WEEKLY ASSIGNMENTS:

In this course, the week ends on Sunday at 11:59PM (Canvas Pacific Time). Students not in the Pacific Time Zone can adjust the time zone in Canvas under "Settings" to reflect their local time rather than calculating the difference in time zones for each assignment and exam.

Each week there is <u>either</u> a written assignment or a discussion post. Information about each assignment is found on Canvas under the Module for that week. All assignments are submitted through Canvas and <u>not emailed</u> to the instructor

- Written assignments are due on Sundays at 11:59PM.
- Discussions have two parts: A student's initial post to the question is due by Friday at 11:59PM. For full credit in a discussion a response to another student's post is due by Sunday at 11:59PM.

ART PAPER

This is a 3 to 4 page paper with instructions posted on Canvas.

EXAMS

There is syllabus quiz (see participation), a midterm and final exam all multiple choice. Exams are not cumulative, a Study Sheet and image list is provided for the midterm and final exams.

LATE WORK

Late work will not be accepted (no makeup exams). If you have an extenuating circumstance, please contact me by email <u>before the assignment is due</u> to make alternate arrangements.

Each student has the option to complete one (1) extra credit assignment.

<u>Respect Disagreement</u>. People have the right to disagree with you. However, disagreement should never be personal. Online discussions are a means to share ideas and practice the skill of persuasion. Persuasive speech cannot be achieved with hurtful, hateful or inappropriate language. Review your posts before you publish and reread them for unintended meanings.

<u>Ask Questions</u>. Cultural influences can influence communication in terms of phrasing and word choice. The lack of visual and auditory clues may affect meaning, as well. Before jumping to conclusions, ask for clarification.

<u>Be Forgiving</u>. For the majority of participants, online communication is straight forward. Sometimes unintended meanings are conveyed.
