Course Descriptions

Description and Requirements for LART 250 (3 credits):

LART 250 is designed to help you develop the abilities necessary for college-level reading and essay writing.

Student Learning Outcomes

You must demonstrate the reading and writing process and metacognitive awareness in a combined reading and writing portfolio of your strongest work, due at the end of the quarter. You will be invited to submit a portfolio during Week 11 of this quarter if your grade in EWRT 1A/LART 250 is a C or higher at the beginning of Week 10. There will be no exceptions. You must submit a portfolio, complete the CSA requirements (4 activities of your choice), visit a tutor at the WRC or NetTutor with at least one of your drafts before you submit the final essay for a grade, and submit all formal essays to pass LART 250 and receive a grade for EWRT 1A.

Course Objectives for LART 250:

- ● Learn to read and analyze a variety of college-level texts;
- ● Use schema to read and comprehend;
- ● Demonstrate vocabulary growth;

- • Analyze fiction and nonfiction;
- • Apply pre-reading and annotation strategies;
- • Develop topics and ideas for essays (pre-writing strategies);
- • Write and support thesis statements;
- • Organize ideas in essays;
- • Identify and practice writing for different audiences and purposes;
- • Develop a foundation for handling many writing and reading tasks;
- • Practice writing and reading as multi-step processes;
- • Compose organized, developed essays that increase in complexity;
- • Practice various sentence structures to improve sentence complexity and style;
- • Proofread for recurrent usage and sentence-level errors.
- To achieve these goals and objectives, you can expect to:
- Gain confidence in writing essays, including in-class essays for your EWRT 1A course
- Compose pre-writing and reading exercises;
- Complete vocabulary and other reading assignments;
- Take reading quizzes;
- Use vocabulary words in essays, assignments and class activities;
- Read and discuss several readings, i.e. a novel, articles, essays; Participate actively in group discussions and presentations; Discuss your work with classmates in peer-response sessions; Stay up-to-date on reading and assignments.

EWRT 1A (5 units)

EWRT 1A is an introduction to university-level reading and writing (5 units) with an emphasis on analysis. We will closely examine a variety of texts (personal, popular, literary, professional, academic) from culturally diverse traditions. We will practice common rhetorical strategies used in academic writing. We will compose clear, well-organized, and well-developed essays, with varying purposes and different audiences, from personal to academic. This course is transferable to all UC, CSU, and private colleges.

Technology requirements

1. Internet Connection I recommend a Broadband/DSL connection to most effectively view online videos and participate in video conferences. The college can help you with access if you don't have this!
2. Computer You will need a computer with current operating system to login to Canvas and complete the activities. The college can help you with access if you don't have this!
3. Canvas Student App I do not recommend using a smartphone to do the work, but it may be helpful to check on due dates.
4. Word Processor: You will have assignments in this class that prompt you to use a word processing application. There are numerous options available when it comes to word processing software; Here are links to three free options you may use: Microsoft Office 365, Google Docs, and Apache Open Office.
5. A pdf Reader, such as Adobe.
6. Kanopy and *The New York Times*

Kanopy and the NYT are available to you as a De Anza student. Kanopy is an on-demand streaming video platform for public libraries and universities. Course Description:

EWRT 1A is an introduction to university-level reading and writing with an emphasis on analysis, we will move from personal analysis (Essay #1) to choosing a side in a debate (Essay#2) to analysis of characters in short stories (Essay #3) to the analysis of a central theme in a novel, using a framing text to analyze that novel (Essay #4). The questions about humanity, AI, and scientific exploration are endless, and the purpose of this class will be to debate and discuss big ideas in a safe, respectful way; to learn to read literature within a sociological, ethical, and philosophical framework. This class will improve communication skills, literacy, and critical thinking. We will write four formal papers -one timed essay and three academic essays.

Student Learning Outcome (SLO):

- Practice writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies.
- Read and analyze rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.

EWRT 1A Course Requirements

Students can expect instructor feedback on formal papers and some assignments within a week of submission. All formal papers will be graded by a rubric, which is included and available as the assignment becomes available. Papers are graded in terms of sophistication of content and argument; clarity of organization; fluidity of expression through sentence structure; fluency of grammar, punctuation, and spelling; and adherence to MLA format. Please understand that the grade you receive and the feedback I give on each paper is to help you write future papers and decide which paper to revise and include in the portfolio. It is your job to revise as you see fit, with the help of a tutor if needed.

Scores from the tutorials will be entered and shown in assignments on Canvas, but there isn't an actual tutorial assignment on Canvas that requires students to upload work.

Students must go to the link on the home page of Canvas to access these tutorials.

Online tutorials are designed to give students hands-on practice recognizing how other writers make "the moves that matter in academic writing" and how to use the templates to begin writing themselves. Each tutorial supports one chapter from *They Say/I Say* and guides students to read, recognize the moves, and write papers.

Turnitin

You will submit essays to Canvas with a tool called turnitin.com, which checks for plagiarism and also gives feedback on grammar. Please note that turnitin.com will flag AI use such as Grammarly and ChatGPT, so please do not use them.

Formatting

Please use MLA formatting for essays. Include an MLA header with your name and date.

Use a double-spaced 12-point font such as arial, palentino, Times New Roman.

English 1A Formal ESSAY GUIDELINES:

- All essays must be at least 4-6 pages (250 words per page = 1000-1500 words) and double-spaced
- The in-class essay must have an outline associated with it.
- Each essay must have your full name, due date and title on the first page.
- **You must complete ALL of the formal essays to pass both LART 250 and EWRT 1A. This means that the essays must be submitted for a grade before or on the due date on the calendar in Canvas. To pass LART 250, you must have a passing grade of C or higher in the EWRT 1A/LART 250 class by the beginning of Week 10. You will then be invited to submit a portfolio of your work to the Language Arts Department.**

Late Work, Extensions, and Revisions

- Tutorials are due on Sundays at 11:59pm. Late submissions will **NOT** receive credit. These are self-paced tutorials and are assigned for your benefit!
- Online Discussions Posts are due Thursdays and Responses are due Fridays. **Discussion due dates cannot be extended, due to their interactive nature. Late posts to online Discussions may receive partial credit, but you will not be able to receive full credit for the discussion. Late responses will NOT receive any credit. Think of Discussions as group work.**
- **Peer Reviews** are time-sensitive. You will NOT receive credit if you do not submit them on time, since they are a group project.
- **Formal Essays** - 1, 2, 3, and 4 are **REQUIRED** to pass the course. They MUST be submitted in ordered succession - that is, I will NOT grade Essay 4 if you have not yet submitted Essay 3. If you need an extension for any of the Formal Essays, please contact me **BEFORE** the due date and we can work out a plan of action. Essays 1, 2, and 3 must be submitted before Week 10.

Participants are expected to submit assignments on or before the assigned due date, which, in turn, allows me time to review their work and provide meaningful feedback. A revision of either Essay 1 or Essay 3 is required for the LART 250 portfolio. There are no grade changes for these revisions. I highly encourage you to go to the WRC or NetTutor to review your work before you submit it for a grade. Due dates have been designed in the course to ensure time is provided to allow you to produce your best work.

Time management is tough and life happens, so sometimes we might miss deadlines! You're in luck: homework can receive credit if submitted late. **SOME** homework assignments submitted after the deadline may receive a 10% grade point deduction for each day following the due date and time. If you need an extension for any formal assignment, please contact me **before** the due date and I can work with you.
