

PREREQUISITES: A passing grade in ESL 255/455 or a passing score on the Placement Test. To be eligible to take ESL 272 and ESL 273, you must receive credit for ESL 261/461 and 265/465.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: ESL 265/465 will develop low-advanced skills for writing clear, organized, well-developed multi-paragraph compositions, grammar, sentence structure, reading comprehension, and vocabulary.

COURSE TIME COMMITMENT: Students should expect to spend two hours of outside preparation for each hour of classroom instruction. *Thus, expect an average of* **10-12 hours** *of homework a week for this class alone. See course catalog for hours commitment.*

- Read, comprehend, and analyze low-advanced level texts from a variety of cultural, societal, and personal perspectives using a variety of reading strategies.
- Write connected, multi-paragraph compositions that demonstrate analytical thinking in response to texts.
- Demonstrate low-advanced level sentence structure, grammar, and vocabulary.
- Expand academic vocabulary comprehension and usage.
- Evaluate, revise, and edit your own writing and the writing of classmates.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES (SLOs): By the end of this class, you will be able to

- Write well-developed, connected, analytical paragraphs in response to reading materials.
- Evaluate your own writing for unity, coherence, clarity, development and rhetorical structure by means of revision and editing.
- Demonstrate understanding and usage of low- advanced grammar, sentence structure, and vocabulary in writing and reading.
- Demonstrate reading comprehension skills of low-advanced academic reading materials and fiction.
- Identify and analyze organization and rhetorical modes of extended reading materials.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS (same for credit and noncredit students)

- 1.) **Various writing assignments** including paragraphs, summaries, and short essays. Some with required revisions.
- 2.) **Mid-term and Final Exams** (in-class): Multi-paragraph writing assignments (short essays) written in class. The mid-term is revised; the final exam is not revised. No Make Ups.
- 3.) **Reading, Writing & Vocabulary Journal:** You will keep a weekly journal that reflects on these skills.
- 4.) **Homework:** will include reading, textbook exercises, paragraph writing, and editing your own work to build your reading, writing & grammar skills.
- 5.) **Classwork and Active, Regular Participation:** Please come to class ready to interact and participate.

COURSE POLICIES

• **Attendance**: While attendance is not part of your grade, you will get the most out of this class by attending all class meetings. Please **email me – in advance- if you must miss a class**.

- **Arrive on time.** It is disrespectful to others to arrive late. Please talk to me if there is a reason you will have difficulty getting to class at the start time.
- **Electronic devices**, unless being used for class time activity/work, should not be used.
- **Cameras on** during online meetings. Unless you have a very strong reason, I prefer cameras to be on so that we can more easily interact with one another.

 - Using generative AI (i.e., ChatGPT, Bing, etc.) to develop, create, write and/or edit any part of your assignments for this class.

Policy for students Report Form for Faculty

- **Plagiarism** means using someone else's work as your own -- without citing the source. Plagiarized work, if found, will receive a "O."
