All exams and graded work will be taken online and accessed through our class's Canvas site. There are <u>no on-campus</u>

You must <u>buy access to *Achieve*</u>, our course's required Course Management System. Course assignments will be done on Achieve.

You may <u>either</u> buy access to *Achieve* packaged with a print version of Roark, *The American Promise*, 9th ed, Vol. 2, Value edition textbook (option 1 below), <u>or</u> you may buy *Achieve* access alone (option 2) which includes no print book. If you buy option 2, you will use exclusively the *e-book The American Promise* that is always on Achieve. Option 2 is the least costly option but comes with no hard textbook.

Buy Option 1 Or Option 2, but Not Both.

Option 1 is available for purchase <u>only</u> from the bookstore. Package of Roark, et al., *The American Promise*, 9th ed, Value Edition, Volume 2 packaged <u>with</u> access to <u>Achieve</u> for *The American Promise*, 9 ed. If you purchase this **Textbook-with-Achieve package** from the bookstore, please note that the access code for Achieve is located on the **inside front cover** of your textbook package. You will need to scratch off the code and enter it into your Achieve course on our Canvas website. <u>Do NOT buy a *Used* copy of this package</u>, because no used copy of the book includes access to *Achieve*.

Option 2. <u>Achieve alone</u> for Roark, *The American Promise*, 9th edition, Volume (2-Term Access). Note: This option is <u>not</u> available at the bookstore. <u>Achieve access alone can only be</u> <u>purchased online through our course's Canvas site</u>. Also note: As this option comes with no print textbook, you will use only the e-book of *The American Promise* that is always on Achieve.

3. Buy, or otherwise access, David Howard-Pitney, *Martin Luther King Jr, Malcolm X, and the Civil Rights Struggle of the 1950s and 1960s*. The bookstore order for it allows you to buy it new or used in paperback or to buy or rent it as an e-book.

Paper copies of *Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, and the Civil Rights Struggle of the* 1950s and 1960s are also available for <u>free checkout</u> to students from Academic **Course Reserves** in the De Anza College Library [<u>https://www.deanza.edu/library/index.html</u>].

How to connect to Achieve through **Canvas** in Once you are on our Canvas course site, click on the **Macmillan Learning button** found on the left column of the Canvas homepage. You will have three options: purchase access, use an access code from your bookstore book bundle, or request a 14-day trial access.

Media Availability: Reliable Internet access is required.

Writing Requirements: There is a Term Essay of approximately 1000 words, based on the book *Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, and the Civil Rights Struggle of the 1950s and 1960s* that is due on June 19 (see Essay Assignment for detailed directions). Each Exam has an Essay section of approximately 500 words. There are numerous Discussion Board postings of about 250 words each. All De Anza history courses require a minimum of 1700 words (6.8 pages) of assigned papers and exams.

<u>All student written work will be checked for plagiarism and AI Chat GPT by Turnitin</u>. Also note that when you submit any *written assignment* you will *temporarily* get full points for it, but that is only temporary. <u>Only when the instructor reads and grades a written</u> assignment, will students get their permanent score.

There will be 3 EXAMS, worth 60 points each. Each Exam will cover only the reading and other course materials assigned for its portion and will not cover material previously covered by an earlier exam. No Exam, including the Final, is cumulative. There is one ESSAY for 60 points based on the *Martin Luther King & Malcolm X* book. There will be 4 Discussion Board Assignments, worth a total of 35 points.

Quizzes and exams are available for taking only up to their due dates but not after. Only <u>one</u> graded assignment over the whole course will be allowed to be made up after its due date, so I advise students NOT to delay taking an assignment until just before its due.
