

WELCOME TO INTRODUCTION TO ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course will examine the history and philosophy of the administration of justice in the United States. There will be a study of the three components of the justice system, their role expectations and interrelationships, the process of criminal justice to include related Amendments of the Constitution, criminal data collection and its effect on the system, the nature and purpose of law, professionalism and ethics in the justice field, and the juvenile justice system. The course will explore Homeland Security development and implementation, ethics and leadership in criminal justice, and the need for critical thinking.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students will identify the history, purpose, role, and responsibilities of the police, court, and corrections components of the criminal justice system.
- 2. Examine the national criminal activity date collection systems, the analysis of the data collected, and how it affects the justice system.
- 3. Study the foundation of the establishment of law, Constitutional Amendments guaranteeing individual rights, categories of crime and punishments.
- 4. Examine and discuss professionalism, ethical standards and leadership, and critical thinking expectations for practitioners within the criminal justice profession.
