# **FILM/TV 7: SCRIPT ANALYSIS**

**Description**: Students in this course will learn how to analyze feature films and screenplays with an emphasis on the development of professional screenwriters' vocabulary and tools. This course will emphasize critical analysis of foundational elements of screenwriting, including character, tension, structure, and theme. Works will be contextualized within the cultural conditions of the times in which they were created.

\*Instructor Addition to Standard Course Description: Students will learn and practice how both script coverage and development note-giving works (not the same thing) in a professional context, and how significant a role this plays for writers and industry personnel before and during the development phase. Students will practice the screenwriters' craft in class and through homework, and engage with peers, their instructor and with scholarly analysis to write and speak convincingly on topics relevant to discussions.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- Examine the nature of the screenplay and its role in film, video, and electronic media production.
- Evaluate how screenplays have evolved historically in craft, form, and business from the earliest days of filmmaking to today's media arts
- Analyze and compare screenwriters from various racial/ethnic and cultural groups and their screenplays with the films produced from those screenplays.
- Analyze the foundations of screenplay writing, including the central components of the three-act structure and exceptions to Hollywood's predominant storytelling form.

#### Goals:

- Define the screenwriter's role in the creation of film, video, and electronic media production.
- Demonstrate knowledge of historical, cultural, critical, theoretical and emergent aspects
  of the screenplay in media arts, including diverse perspectives and contributions in the
  discipline.
- Apply a critical methodology based on advanced elements of narrative fiction writing to analyze the fundamental components and aesthetics of audio-visual storytelling, using the vocabulary and language of professional screenwriters.

**Methods:** Assigned readings, lectures, film and video screenings, class discussions and workshops, written work.

**Note:** Due to the nature of the course, adult themes and language will be used. Some films may reflect dated societal attitudes from the time when they were created as well.

**Required Text:** *Screenwriting for Neurotics,* by Scott Sublett. Instructor will provide free electronic access.

**Primary Recommended Text:** *The Protagonist's Journey,* by Scott Myers. Instructor will provide free electronic access.

**Secondary Recommended Text:** Essentials of Screenwriting: The Art, Craft & Business of Film & Television Writing, by Richard Walter (available through De Anza bookstore and/or their library ebook database, Amazon, other retailers. Instructor cannot provide free access)

**Attendance:** This class is intended to be a free-flowing discussion of the films we screen. Because many of the concepts we discuss will build off one another, your attendance and participation are essential to get the most out of this class.
