Course Description

This is an introduction to the close analysis of film and television texts. The course will examine broad questions of form and content, aesthetics and meaning, and history and culture. Covering a wide variety of media, filmmakers, and film movements, the course will explore the diverse possibilities presented by the cinematic art form. Topics include modes of production, narrative and non-narrative forms, visual design, editing, sound, genre, ideology, and critical analysis.

Section information text:

F/TV-Intro To Cinematic Arts is Fully ONLINE. This class does not have scheduled meetings. Students can log in anytime to do the required weekly course work. Students must have access to a computer, the internet and an individual email address. We recommend a laptop or desktop computer to successfully complete the course; a tablet or phone may not be adequate for all assignments and tests. Most De Anza classes will use the Canvas course management system. Student Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate the ability to critically analyze, interpret, and write about film and electronic media using film-specific language.
- Demonstrate visual literacy through the application of the analytical tools of categories, theories, and ideologies to understand the complex role and function of the cinematic arts in society, including representations of class, race/ethnicity, gender, ability, and sexuality.
- Demonstrate the ability to critically analyze film and television as a technology, business, cultural production/cultural artifact, entertainment medium and art form.
- Demonstrate recognition, description and analysis of formal aesthetics elements of the cinematic arts i.e.: narrative, mise-en-scene, cinematography, editing, sound.



Required Feature films

You will be required to view at least one feature film per module in this class. These feature films will be embedded in Canvas via streaming resources provided by the DeAnza Library for free screening. Once you access to your Canvas class, you will be able to stream the films.

Students are required to create a Kanopy and Swank account for access.

Methods of Instruction

All instruction takes place within Canvas: Online video Lectures, Film screenings and facilitated group discussions, assigned reading, announcements, internet exploration, and one final exam.

Student Responsibilities:

This online course contains an Introduction, followed by modules. You will be required to complete one to two modules per week. See Canvas modules or schedule below for due dates. Each module requires a minimum of 12 hours. We will be working with the Canvas platform.

Each module typically involves the following:

- 1. Reading Assignment: Do the Reading and assignment covering the material covered in the lesson.
- 2. View film clips associated with the reading.
- 3. Quiz: Take the online quiz covering the material covered in the lesson.
- 4. View assigned feature film(s). Many of the feature films will be embedded in Canvas via streaming resources provided by the DeAnza Library. Once you access Canvas you will be able to stream the films directly in each weekly Module. You are responsible for watching the assigned films by the lesson closing dates.
- 5. Discussion: Answer and respond to students using the Discussion forum.

Each module closes at 11:59 pm (Pacific Standard Time) approximately 7 days after it has opened. You will be required to complete at least one module per week. After each new module has opened, you will have about one week to complete. See modules for exact calendar dates and exceptions.

Late material will be marked down 50%. Each module should take about 12 hours to complete, depending on your study skills.

Plan to complete your assignments accordingly. Students are expected to post to the discussion board, do the Reading Assignments/tests at their scheduled time during each week. If you post earlier, I can provide more in-depth feedback.

Online classes require your discipline and focus much more so than on-campus classes. I recommend you reserve blocks of time on your weekly calendar to study for this class, and to work on class assignments and readings.

Dishonesty such as cheating, plagiarism or knowingly furnishing false information to the college is prohibited and will lead to appropriate disciplinary action. Al/bot/computer-generated assistance in writing is discouraged. For details see <u>Academic Integrity</u>.

If you plan to travel during the term, make sure that you have reliable Internet connection to take a test or to submit any work that is due during your absence. Not

having a computer or access to the Internet are never valid excuses to miss submissions in my online classes.

Participation

Participation is essential to your success in this class. In distance education courses you are required to participate just as if you were in a face-to-face course. This means that in order to get full credit for participation, you will have to complete your Discussion assignments and Reading Assignments on a timely basis. Consistent failure to participate in class will result in being dropped from the course.

Discussions are a way for you to engage with each other about the course content. Each lesson module will have a question that links to a discussion topic. You can also access each topic by clicking on the link in the course navigation menu. *In order to get full credit for each discussion, you will need to post a thoughtful, well-written response to the question and also respond to at least one other student.*

All course work must be completed to pass this course. Everything discussed during class (e.g., screenings, lectures, clips shown), as well as required reading is subject to examination. Students who do not participate in the discussions and Reading Assignments during the first two weeks of class may be dropped.

Ways to Communicate with me

In this course we will use the **Canvas mail Inbox** feature to send email for private messages. The inbox link is in the global navigation menu located on the left side of every page in Canvas. You can either check your messages in the Canvas system or set your notifications to your preferred method of contact. Please check your messages regularly. When submitting messages, please do the following:

Put a subject in the subject box that describes the email content with your name, week and message subject. For example: YourNameWk2Assignment

Do not submit your assignments by message.

Make certain to check your messages frequently.

I want to hear from you regularly (weekly or more is best) as if we were in live class, and not just when there's a problem. Contact can simply include a post to the weekly Discussion. You can also contact me via zoom.

I will hold office hours Mondays from 2-3 pm via Zoom, plus I can be available for virtual office hours by appointment.

- If you can't make it on Mondays between 2 and 3 pm, just send me an e-mail to set up a time/date. I will try my best to accommodate.
- In online courses it is normal to have many questions about things that relate to the course, such as clarification about assignments, course materials, or assessments. Please email me through the Canvas inbox. Be sure to include

your name in the subject line. If your question is regarding Canvas, I encourage you to contact Canvas support.

Ways you will hear from me:

During this course, I will be posting *announcements* weekly. They will appear under the Announcements area in this course and on the home page. These can be sent to you directly through your DeAnza email from Canvas. *Be sure that you have set your notifications for the course, so you don't miss out on important messages.*

Please make certain to check the announcement daily, as they may contain important information about upcoming deadlines, support material or class concerns. I also post an 'Instructor Closing Comments' announcement at the close of each module.

- I send out weekly reminders of material due that week.
- I send out 'Instructor Closing Comments' at the end of each module through the Announcements.
- I will send out announcements covering community events related to course content.

At the end of each week, if you haven't submitted work or not logged in, you will be hearing from me in Canvas Inbox. I will send a group message to all students who haven't submitted an assignment. This is a warm nudge to remind you or figure out if you need additional support. This isn't about being "in trouble"; rather it is a reminder of the support you have.

At the end of Weeks 2 and 4, if you have yet to participate regularly in the course, I will send out an email with a reminder that you may be dropped from the course due to inactivity and, if needed, a link to support services through De Anza Connect.

For discussion posts, I will respond to students within the discussion before the time it is due and post my closing comments the day after, offering a summary, asking questions, etc. If you enter a discussion post late, be sure to always read my comments on other students' posts. I will make private comments in discussion posts if an issue or question comes up or if more guidance is needed.

Turnaround/Feedback

During the week, I will check my Canvas Inbox and monitor the discussion board at least once a day. I will post comments about each assignment in our weekly announcements and within the discussion thread and your assignment comments. If you have a concern about your grade or anything regarding this course, please send me a message, you can expect a response within 48 hours, although I tend to respond much earlier.

Is Your Computer Ready?

You should have a reliable Internet Service Provider with speeds suitable for streaming video and accessing large files. These speeds are most often delivered by cable, DSL, or satellite. The minimum average connection speed recommended is 20 Mbps. You can your connection speed with free tools such as <u>Speedtest.net</u>

You will need to have an up-to-date browser, operating system and some additional software on your computer to take this class. Check the <u>Canvas page</u> for hardware & software requirements.

<u>Which browsers does Canvas support?</u> Because it's built using web standards, Canvas runs on Windows, Mac, Linux, iOS, Android, or any other device with a modern web browser. <u>Chrome</u> is recommended for the optimal experience.

<u>Run the OEI Computer readiness test.</u> The Computer Readiness Test will test your current browser for plugins and versions to help you navigate general websites.
