COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory survey course in the history of art from ca. 1600 to 1880's. Art and architecture produced in Europe will be analyzed for its cultural, historical as well as political significance. Major works of art along with the concept of the artist and architect will be explored during such stylistic periods as the Baroque, Rococo, Enlightenment, Neoclassicism, Romanticism, Realism and Impressionism. **Recommended**: English Writing 1A or English as a Second Language 5

This is an online asynchronous course, but it is <u>not a self-paced course</u>. The course concepts and vocabulary is presented through PowerPoint video lectures, videos, written assignments, discussions and readings with weekly assignments due at the end of each week. Also, there is a required museum visit which is completed by students on their own time.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME STATEMENTS (SLO'S)

- ° Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was defining factor in the production of works of art.
- ° Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of art.
- Students will investigate different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.

ART PAPER -FINAL PROJECT

This is a 3 to 4 page written paper requiring a visit to a museum to view a work of art. Any fees associated with this assignment are the responsibility of the student. Instructions for this assignment are posted on Canvas. The art object must be one viewed during the quarter the assignment is submitted. If a student is unable to visit a museum, then contact the instructor for an alternate assignment. The alternate assignment is determined by the instructor *otherwise no credit*.

EXAMS

There is syllabus quiz (see participation), and chapter quizzes after two or three modules and all quizzes are multiple choice in format.

LATE WORK

Manage your time to submit work by the date due. No Credit on assignments posted in the comments section of an assignment. A documented excuse such as a doctor's excuse is required to reopen quizzes or a recent assignment. If you have an extenuating circumstance, please contact me by email <u>before the assignment is due</u> to make other arrangements.

Each student has the option to complete one (1) extra credit assignment.

Failure to give credit to ideas, sentences or paragraphs not the student's work is plagiarism. I may ask for a student's notes or a draft if an assignment shows 30% or higher AI generated. If the student does not have notes, then the student will need to rewrite the assignment with an object provided by the instructor. A document which is 100% AI generated is considered plagiarized and no credit. Turn-it-in checks for the use of AI generated material.

<u>Have Opinions</u>. Everyone is entitled to have an opinion. In discussion forums, everyone is encouraged to share them.

<u>Respect Disagreement</u>. People have the right to disagree with you. However, disagreement should never be personal. Online discussions are a means to share ideas and practice the skill of persuasion. Persuasive speech cannot be achieved with hurtful, hateful or inappropriate language. Review your posts before you publish and reread them for unintended meanings.

<u>Ask Questions</u>. Cultural influences can influence communication in terms of phrasing and word choice. The lack of visual and auditory clues may affect meaning, as well. Before jumping to conclusions, ask for clarification.

<u>Be Forgiving</u>. For the majority of participants, online communication is straight forward. Sometimes unintended meanings are conveyed.
