Description: An introduction to music through Rock music tracing its beginnings in the early 1950s to the present. Various Rock styles will related to the historical trends and events of the time period being studied; listening techniques; use of fundamental concepts including form, style, musical media, and textures; acquaintance with and comparison of musical examples from various styles.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate an understanding of the common functions and elements of Western popular music
- Identify and distinguish between various rock and related genres, musical elements and instrumentation
- Demonstrate knowledge of representative important writers, producers and performers of Rock music.
- Identify historic elements in the development of Rock music and their contributing styles.
- Identify social aspects reflected in, and contributing to, musical styles and song lyrics
- Employ a basic vocabulary of common music terms to describe observations of recorded and live music.
- Recognize individual instruments and voices and the various ensembles in which they are used.

The Goals of This Course: By the end of this course you will develop an understanding of both the musical and cultural roots of Rock music in its historical context but also experienced from a purely musical perspective. The class provides a survey of British and American Rock music and begins with predecessors of Rock such as Jazz, the Blues, and Country and Western genres. The course then traces the development of from the early 1950s into the present day, including artists such as Chuck Berry, the Beatles, Jimi Hendrix, Led Zeppelin, Metallica, Nirvana, and Rage Against the Machine.

Each week we will provide a playlist of 10 songs related to the modules. In class I will play these songs and the student must provide the title, composer and year or creation.

Discussions

Throughout the course, you will participate in five discussions and interact with fellow peers. Each discussion will address key topics presented in each of the five modules. Specific instructions and due dates will be provided in each discussion. Posts will be graded using the discussion rubric.

Projects

You will complete and submit three projects, each one to satisfy specific objectives related to this rock history course. For each project, you will have several multimedia options to present your response to the prompt. Detailed directions and grading rubric will be provided in each project assignment.

Film Report

You will write a Film Report based on a critical review of a film relevant to rock history. Detailed directions and grading rubrics will be provided in the Film Report assignment.

Concert Report

You will write a concert report based on a critical review of a live performance that you attend either in-person or view online. Detailed directions and grading rubric will be provided in the Concert Report assignment.
