### **Learning Outcomes and Objectives:**

- Employ a basic vocabulary of common music terms to describe observations of recorded and live music.
- Recognize individual instruments and voices and the various ensembles in which they are used.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the roles of music in human cultures and relate musical expression to other forms of artistic expression and to culture generally.

- Distinguish features of important musical style periods, forms, composers, and practices.
- Recognize, describe, and compare musical practices in contemporary society.
- Recognize basic distinguishing characteristics among a representative group of musical compositions.

### **CSLOs**

- Employ a basic vocabulary of common music terms to describe observations of recorded and live music.
- Recognize individual instruments and voices in the various ensembles in which they are used while identifying the time period of given compositions.

It is extremely helpful to enroll in an "ensemble" music class, such as Chamber Orchestra, Concert Band, Chorale, or Piano class and/or "theory" music class, such as Music Fundamentals, Comprehensive Musicianship so the concepts we cover can be related to "real world" applications.

### Classroom procedure:

This class will be held online. **Students are required to submit one concert report on a live concert performed on campus.** Our class time will be spent in introduction to the discipline of music; methods of understanding music available in modern culture; listening techniques; use of fundamental concepts including form, style, musical media, and textures; acquaintance with and comparison of musical examples from various eras and cultures; roles of music in society.

### **Class Participation and Expectations:**

Students should expect to dedicate approximately 10-15 hours per module in this class. The time required will differ among students, depending on their study habits. This workload encompasses reading assignments, viewing lecture videos, listening to and analyzing musical examples, and completing assigned tasks.

**Assignments:** The DUE DATES are designed to encourage a smooth flow of work and keep all studying material on track. Assignments **will be accepted 1-2 weeks** after the due date with penalty applied. No late submission/completion after the "Until Date". Be sure to check the dates for each assignment and observe the grade and any comments from your instructor for each assignment.

- Quizzes: All quiz questions will be based upon the required reading material, listening
  material and discussion prompts. All quizzes are timed. The quizzes will be open notes,
  open book but not open internet (Cheating/Plagiarism!). Searching the internet for
  quick answers on a quiz is prohibited. Students are allowed to take each quiz no more
  than 2 attempts. A 70% penalty will be applied to late submission/completion after the
  Due Date.
- **Discussions:** Each week we will have a topic to discuss using the Discussion tool in Canvas. These weekly discussion topics will vary from week to week as will the points. These entries will usually be due the Sunday at the end of each week. This is to ensure

that students are actively involved in the online class. A 80% penalty will be applied to late submission/completion after the Due Date.

### **Final Course Project- Live Concert Report:**

There is no final exam for this course, however there will be a final course project- Live Concert Report on your observations on **De Anza College Music Department Concert on campus**. This is not a research paper as you will comment on your own observations. This report is worth 20 points. Concert report must turn in by the end of 11<sup>th</sup> week. **Late submissions are not accepted**. Submit all pages of the report in ONE file, no separate submissions. Additional information is in the Final Course Project Module: Live Concert Report.

## Students unable to attend the live concert should consider dropping this class!

#### Communication:

Canvas Inbox and Discussion is the best way to contact the instructor. During the weekdays I will check every 24 hours weekdays and weekends every 48 hours. Do not use the comment section of the assignments to communicate a new message to your instructor.

The course lecture is divided into modules with the assignments and exams. It is the student's responsibility to carefully review/observe all lectures, reading material and listening examples. Please always check due dates for assignments as well as assignment details. Although online materials will be available, these are not a substitute for classroom lectures and discussions.
