Description:

This course provides an introduction to the theory, terminology, and operation of single-camera video production, including composition and editing techniques, camera operation, portable lighting, video recorder operation, audio control, and basic editing. This course focuses on the aesthetics and fundamentals of scripting, producing, directing on location, postproduction, exhibition, and distribution through the completion of several short video projects.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Apply the creative use of camera, sound, and editing techniques to produce a completed video project.

Develop the visual storytelling skills needed to take a film idea from concept to realization.

Course Goals:

- Demonstrate creative control of the technical and aesthetic aspects of the visual and sound elements in a single camera video production.
- Utilize the basic operations of the digital video camera in a single camera setting.
- Integrate the basic principles of cinematography as they relate to the digital video image.
- Identify and apply basic digital editing techniques and procedures.
- Identify and apply basic techniques of audio both in on-set recording and in post-production.
- Use pre-production planning and scriptwriting to develop concepts and pre-visualize the story.

 Identify film and digital video career opportunities with a focus upon the importance of teamwork in a crew setting and the moral and ethical responsibility that comes with being a filmmaker.

Editing Lab

In this class we will be editing on **Adobe Premiere Pro**. You will have free access to all Adobe Creative Cloud applications, which are installed on all stations in the lab. During the hours of the Equipment Room, the lab is available to work unless there is an animation class in session. You will be able to use this free subscription for the remainder of the quarter as an enrolled production student.

Attendance Policy

EXERCISES

Students will have two exercises to complete over a series of weeks, in class, to learn and practice each stage of production.

PROJECTS

Students will complete three projects. The time limit for each is invariable—no exceptions.

Projects 1 & 2 are to be produced outside of class and must be "greenlit" before shooting. For each project the student must submit the required materials (P1 – Storyboard & Hazard Form & P2 - Script, Shot List & Hazard Form) to be greenlit through Canvas. The Hazard Form requires the student to state whether the project has any potentially hazardous shooting conditions. If so, the student must inform the instructor on the form what they will do to keep their set safe. When the required Hazard Form has been signed by the instructor the student can then take it to the Equipment Room to check out equipment to shoot their project. Until the student has met these requirements, they will not be able to shoot. This process is required in order to receive points for these assignments.

PROJECT 1 – VISUAL STORY – No dialogue – 1-3 min (max with titles/credits)

Each student must storyboard, direct, shoot, and edit a film on their own using the GH7 Lumix camera introduced in class.

PROJECT 2 – NARRATIVE or EXPERIMENTAL – Double System Sound – 1-5 min (max with titles/credits)

Each student must write, direct, shoot with a sound recordist, and edit a film with synched dialogue or sound on location. You cannot act in your PROJECT 2. This project requires a small crew in order to record double system sound. If you want to use a camera other than the GH7 or NX100 introduced in class, it must be approved by the instructor before the Hazard Form is signed.

Projects submitted without going through the process or not reflecting the required materials or agreements about additional equipment will receive a grade of F. Students must shoot Project 1 before they can shoot Project 2. Late assignments will receive less credit.

PROJECT 3 – CREW PROJECT - 1-5 min (max with titles/credits)

The class will collaborate through each stage of production in crews, creating a collective project. Roles will be assigned, and each student is expected to contribute creatively and technically on and off set. This project must be recorded with the NX100 camera.

IMPORTANT: Crew members cannot act in their projects. Talent will be other students in the class.

Project Suggestions:

Narrative:

- 1. Beat change within a scene
- 2. Behavior which reveals character
- 3. Significant conflict within a scene

Experimental:

- 1. Use of montage to express an emotion or mood
- 2. Explore the qualities of light and darkness
- 3. Explore shape, line, time / space

Quizzes & Exams

Quizzes and exams will test how well the student has understood the lecture material including filmmaking communication and practical demonstration.
