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How this Class Works

1. This is a 12-week **fully online** course.
2. You will learn in a community with your peers. *This is not a self-paced course.*
3. This class does *not* meet regularly in Zoom. Your learning will be conducted asynchronously (which means "not live") in Canvas.
4. By Sunday of Week 1, you will be expected to log-in to our course in Canvas and complete the Orientation Module.
5. On **morning Monday** of each week, you will receive a **weekly announcement** with updates, so please check your email or click "Announcements" in Canvas.
6. New modules are also available on Monday mornings.
7. Due dates are always on **Wednesdays and Sundays at 11:59pm.**
8. Each module contains readings and videos, a quiz, collaborative activities including discussions, and essay assignments.

Course Essentials

Course Description

This course allows students to develop critical thinking skills and the ability to apply these skills to reading and writing. Students will practice analytical and argumentative academic essays based on the reading of complex texts, and the use of outside research leading to analysis, comparison and synthesis, and a documented research paper.

Prerequisite: English Writing 1A. Development of analytical, integrative skills in reading and writing.

How Your Coursework is Weighted

Writing is a process. All of the hard work you put into writing an essay is important. From doing pre-writing activities like freewrites or brainstorming to participating in peer review. So, while your final essay is important, I make sure to also honor your writing process in my grading.

- **Essays: 50% (4500 words)**
- **Homework (pre-writing, exercises, etc.):**
- **10% Quizzes: 10%**
- **Final Research Paper: 30% (1500 words)**

I will occasionally announce extra credit assignments.

How Grades Will Be Weighted

Late Work, Extensions, and Revisions

Late Work

Assignments are always due on Wednesdays and Sundays at 11:59pm.

Every assignment has a due date, rubric, and a deadline for submissions. Participants are expected to submit assignments on or before the assigned due date, which, in turn, allows me time to review your work and provide meaningful feedback. Due dates have been designed in the course to ensure time is provided to allow you to produce your best work.

Time management is tough and life happens, so sometimes we miss deadlines! You're in luck: late submissions are excepted with a penalty. Assignments submitted after the deadline may receive a 10% grade point deduction for each day following the due date and time.

Extensions

Don't want a penalty? I've got you! In this class, we have a late pass:

- Late Pass
- In order to use, simply send a Canvas message or email with the subject "Late Pass for " and include the assignment name.
- To be used, the late pass must be submitted by the assignment due date.
- Late passes cannot be used for rough drafts due to the timing of peer review. You can, however, receive partial credit for late rough drafts.

Revisions

Not happy with your grade? You're in luck! You are allowed to revise one essay this quarter. More information will be available at the end of the quarter." Your new grade will be an average of your original grade and your revision grade.

Formatting for Essays & Assignments

Turnitin

You will submit essays to Canvas with a tool called **turnitin.com**, which checks for plagiarism and also gives feedback on grammar. Please think of it as a tool that can help you become a stronger writer!

Turnitin.com is an accurate plagiarism checker, but if you have questions or concerns, please contact me.

Formatting

Please use MLA formatting for essays, including:

- an MLA header
- 12 point font such as: arial, palatino, times new roman
- Double-spaced

- Please see specific assignments on Canvas for more information on formatting, requirements, and rubrics.

Grammarly

While I expect your essays to be proofread and generally grammar-free, I also understand that English might be your first language. I myself am a terrible speller, so I'll let you in on my secret: Grammarly, which is a great tool for helping you fix grammar!

Lastly...

I understand that sometimes life gets busy, but I ask that you please do not reuse essays from other classes. If for some reason you would like to reuse an essay, let's talk!

AI Policy

My class policy is that if you use AI to craft your work, you will need to give the AI a writing credit as a co-author and you will need to include a write-up in the comments about how you used the AI and what percentage of the writing is from AI. Failure to do so may result in a failing grade.

If you use multiple AI to help you write, you will need to list them all as co-authors. Failure to do so may result in a failing grade.

If your work is found to be more than 30% AI, you will receive a failing grade because the work is not your own.

I use multiple AI detection programs, and I may run your writing through one or more such programs.
